A. Multiple choice

1. **B) can** — Can is followed by the bare infinitive — never by to and never with an -s.
2. **C) can** — Modal verbs have one form for every subject, so there is no cans.
3. **B) Can** — Can makes its own question by moving in front of the subject. No do is used.
4. **B) can't** — The negative is can't or cannot, with the bare infinitive after it.
5. **A) can** — The short answer repeats the modal verb, not the main verb.
6. **C) I can speak Spanish.** — Can is always followed by the base form of the verb, with no to and no -ing.
7. **B) Can** — Can I is the everyday way of asking permission in English.
8. **A) can't** — Can't works for every subject, and the verb after it stays bare.
9. **C) can** — Can also expresses general possibility, not only personal ability.
10. **A) can't** — The negative short answer repeats the modal in its contracted form.
