A. Multiple choice

1. **B) have lost** — The present perfect ties a past event to a present consequence: the keys are still missing now.
2. **C) had already started** — The past perfect marks the earlier of two past events.
3. **B) will have worked** — The future perfect looks back from a point in the future at something completed by then.
4. **B) is going to** — Going to is the form for a prediction based on evidence you can see right now.
5. **B) will get** — Will marks a decision taken at the moment of speaking; going to would imply you had planned it.
6. **B) are having** — The present continuous is the natural form for a fixed personal arrangement.
7. **C) leaves** — The present simple is used for timetables and scheduled public events.
8. **B) has been running** — The present perfect continuous stresses the duration of an activity with a visible present result.
9. **C) have** — How long with a state verb takes the present perfect, because the relationship began in the past and continues.
10. **B) have seen** — An unfinished period of time — your whole life so far — takes the present perfect.

1. **have** — Just with a present result takes the present perfect: have plus the past participle.
2. **will** — Will have plus a past participle is the future perfect, used with a future deadline.
3. **had** — The past perfect marks the earlier of two events in the past.
4. **since** — Since introduces the point at which the period began; for would need a length.
5. **were** — Was or were going to describes an intention that was never carried out.
6. **will** — Will be plus the -ing form is the future continuous, for an action in progress at a future time.
7. **have** — The present perfect continuous asks about a duration that continues into the present.
8. **takes** — Scheduled public transport takes the present simple, not a future form.
