1. **B) hers** — Hers is the possessive pronoun and stands alone; her would need a noun after it.
2. **B) its** — Its is the possessive; it's always means it is or it has.
3. **B) It's** — It's here is the contraction of it is, which is why it takes an apostrophe.
4. **B) herself** — Subject and object are the same person, so the reflexive is required.
5. **B) I** — The pronoun is part of the subject, so the subject form I is correct.
6. **B) me** — Between is a preposition, so it takes the object form me, however formal I may sound.
