2. **B) sent** — A passive relative clause reduces to the past participle alone.
3. **A) Having reviewed** — A perfect participle clause is having plus the past participle and marks the earlier action.
4. **C) Completed** — A passive participle clause of reason uses the past participle on its own.
5. **B) whom** — After a quantifier and of, the pronoun for people is whom, never who or that.
